Sam doesn't quite get that. but he dutifully collects some baby doody and tosses that in as well. It's an amusing conceit and somehow Lowry draws out this mission to fill up an entire book. Her gift is in letting us appreciate Sam's ingenuity without feeling the need to show everyone else discovering what he's up to and repeating what we've already thought: what a clever, imaginative kid! That gives the second book about Sam a more satisfying kick than the first. Lowry's low-key humor throughout is welcome, making it good for kids and adults wanting to share what their tykes are reading. -- Michael Giltz
