



FALLOUT by Sara Paretsky




THE PHENOMENON by Rick Ankiel and Tim Brown


SPOILS by Brian Van Reet

It took about 15 years after the Fall Of Saigon in 1975 for some of the classic works about that tragic war to come to light. The nonfiction masterpiece *A Bright Shining Lie* came out in 1988 and Tim O'Brien's masterful short story collection *The Things They Carried* arrived in 1990. Right on schedule, we're finding one acclaimed work after another about Iraq and Afghanistan hitting shelves. The latest is this acclaimed novel which tells the story of both sides in the Iraqi occupation, ranging from a 19 year female gunner taken hostage to a long-time mujahedeen who is a little freaked out by the *far* more radical mujahedeen showing up now to fight. KILLERS OF THE FLOWER MOON by David Grann


It's a good week for writer David Grann. His bestseller *The Lost City Of Z* has been turned into an acclaimed film. Now here comes his latest work of nonfiction, which uses the Osage designation of "the flower-killing moon" as a metaphor for a terrible time in the history of that Native American nation. It began in the 1920s when the Osage tribe (or "People Of The Middle Waters") suddenly became rich beyond all imagination thanks to oil. But the white man was not going to let this wealth stand. Soon, a series of vicious and coldblooded murders by gunshot or poison or explosion occurred one after. Finally, the very new government agency dubbed the FBI, under a very young and ambitious J. Edgar Hoover, was asked by an Osage council to investigate. Hoover's people got nowhere until he brought in special agent and former Texas Ranger Tom White, an experienced and honest lawman who looked like the hero in a movie serial. He used new methods of annotating and cross referencing of facts and even brought in an American Indian detective who could get people to talk, an unconventional idea for the time. 

WHEN THE WORLD STOPPED TO LISTEN by Stuart Isakoff

In 1958, pianist Van Cliburn electrified the world by going behind the Iron Curtain and triumphing at a piano competition. Since shady scoring still happens today at international sporting events, you can imagine how unlikely that was at the height of the Cold War. Writer Stuart Isacoff -- the founder of the magazine *Piano Today* -- tells the story here, covering Van Cliburn's unlikely artistic career and the repercussions of that event. The story he presents is interesting and surely as thorough as we're likely to get. Isacoff is on firm ground when detailing the state of cultural exchange between the Soviet Union and the West in the 1950s and beyond. He is on less firm ground when detailing Cliburn's eccentric private life, surely in great part because the late Cliburn was not terribly forthcoming given the world he grew up in. Still, Cliburn may have been a sentimentalist, but his story needs someone less willing to overlook the sadder, more tragic moments.... Read More.
