


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************ WHAT'S YOUR FAVORITE BOOK OF THE YEAR?

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

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

Christmas morning my parents were thrilled to present a much-needed ten speed bike. It was about as necessary as socks...and just as exciting to me. But "The Lord Of The Rings?!?!" I hadn't expected that yet it was *exactly* what I wanted and I couldn't wait to dive in again. When my dad realized I'd already read the books, his jaw dropped. Why the heck would I want a copy of a book I'd already read? I felt bad but it really was the best present I ever got. And I devoured them again that Christmas and every Christmas for the next ten years.


