Egypt reportedly began in November 1994, though DreamWorks refuses to comment on this or any other aspect of the movie, such as how many animators have been hired, what stage the script is in, or whether the release date is realistic. Katzenberg, long the force behind Disney animation, will play honcho, and while the stories in circulation about him praise his devotion to quality—he's famously willing to scrap scenes he doesn't like—they don't make him sound like a man who's willing to cut corners to meet a deadline.
